for Community Garden

We'd like to update our readers on the progress of Options' Community Garden. Over the past several months, Options staff have been getting the site ready for the community garden to open this Spring. Before anything is planted there is still much work to be done. Over the next three months we are adding soil amendments, fencing the garden site, planting permanent landscaping, constructing plots, and registering community members to be garden plot holders.

The Options Community Garden is in need of ongoing community support and volunteer labor. We need help constructing a handicap-accessible entry and building raised plots. On Friday, February 11th, we will be having our second volunteer "work party" at the garden where we will be working on constructing and separating individual garden plots.

We are extremely grateful for the support we have received from individuals and organizations including the Four Way Foundation, Chandler Pipeline Construction, Master Gardeners, Josephine County Juvenile Center, Barbara Steffey, Retired & Senior Volunteer Program and Grower's Market.

The garden will provide 30-35 plots, available to individuals and nonprofit organizations at a nominal annual fee of \$25. Registration for the Options Community Garden is open to the public and begins February 15th. You can register by contacting Options or by filling out the online registration form.

Miles Describes Recovery

Miles is a young man who has been working with Options' Case Management and Employment Works programs for the past two and a half years. While he has been making progress all along, Miles' life has changed significantly in the last year. On January 13th Miles was the first consumer to graduate from Dual Solutions drug and alcohol treatment program. Additionally, in the last six months Miles has returned to work. First he worked at Options washing the fleet of cars, then moved on to a catering/grounds keeping position at the Riverside Conference Center. Finally, Miles has received his GED from Rogue Community College and is considering attending college-level classes in the spring term. Crystal McMahon, Options Case Manager, sat down with Miles for a conversation regarding his recent successes.

Crystal: How did you manage to quit using drugs and alcohol?

Miles: By going into the Dual Solutions program, seeing a counselor there and attending groups. By attending AA meetings at the High-Lo Club. By obtaining and talking to a sponsor and by getting support from family, friends and the staff at Options. It has been a long struggle, but I kept on trying and this time it seems to be working.

Crystal: What would you say to others who are in the process of recovery?

Miles: I would have to say that belief in a higher power is very important. Developing a large support network is very helpful. Setting goals and accomplishing them has helped me to develop confidence- stop remembering yesterday and start thinking about tomorrow.

Crystal: Where do you plan to go from here?

Miles: I would like to acquire another part time job, get a car and attend classes at RCC. I'd like to obtain an AA degree. Maybe sometime in the future I will work at the Crisis Resolution Center or some other human service position. By personally going through the recovery process, both from mental illness and addiction, I feel I have something to offer people.

Crystal: We would agree that you have a lot to offer!

As you can imagine, there are a lot of people who are very proud of Miles' accomplishments to date and look forward to hearing about his future. Thank you, Miles.

Options was recently chosen as the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) monitor for the construction of a Head Start child development center on the Rogue Community college campus. In addition, Options was awarded the CDBG grant administration contract for the Siskiyou Community Health Clinic in Cave Junction. For both of these projects, Options will provide monitoring to ensure that they comply with regulatory requirements and projected timelines.
